


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Formal Curriculum

- · Celebrate that our staff reflects the ethnic diversity of Oranga
- Bilingual Teachers
- Bilingual Teacher Aides use for Home School communication
- Bilingual staff to use their first language when appropriate
- · Utilize the prior knowledge of our Pasifika students
- University mentors for targeted Year 5/6 students
- ESOL incorporated into planning to support language, grammar
- Further support for staff in NESB strategies
- Buddy reading opportunities to discuss the children's first language e.g. Samoan, Tongan, Cook Island
- Children to participate in Ethnic Speech Competitions
- · Oranga to host Ethnic Speech Competitions
- Include kirikiti and other Pasifika games as part of the increased focus on physical activity
- Selection of new library books to include Pasifika interest, content and role models
- Give children time to practise new skills with familiar strategies such as repetition
- Continue to choose meaningful contexts for learning so that teaching is an exchange of knowledge and experiences between teacher and children
- Writing in home language is encouraged, displayed and valued
- Assessment results are collated and reported to show trends in student achievement. Specific information, according to ethnicity, will feedforward into future action plans
- Share ideas with parents to support their children's learning
- Use Tupu series ethnic readers and tapes in classrooms
- Expect high standards of presentation in children's books as noted in staff visit to Tonga and Samoa.

Home Community

- Translate important messages into other languages e.g. FAB focus in Tongan, Samoan
- Continue to encourage parents to come to school and be involved in classroom programmes
- Run 'Home School Partnership' on a regular basis
- Tap into the creative talents of our Pasifika community to share their language, customs and arts with our children
- Cherish key parents. Encourage meeting situations where parents can speak their home language
- Set high standards for role models visiting the school
- Have a Pasifika night for parents and teachers involving Pasifika food and dancing
- Encourage and support Pasifika representation on the BOT. Utlise links to support people e.g. Ben Taufua through STA
- Encourage the parents to take the lead in Multicultural festival groups
- Put phrases below into the newsletter to promote the use of Home languages
- Encourage our Tongan parents to know the chain of authority in New Zealand schools
- School to be aware of special religious observances on the yearly calendar that affect our children's learning
- Inform our Pasifika families of the benchmarks for success



School Environment

- Make curriculum topics inclusive of parent support e.g. preparation of food, traditional stories
- Use drums at assembly and on special occasions
- Continue to buy artwork from Pasifika artists for display at school
- Develop protocols to welcome visitors to special ceremonies
- Add Pasifika flavour to traditional occasions e.g. Year 6 Graduation, Duffy assemblies, Prize Giving
- Incorporate Pasifika into landscape plans e.g. choice of plants, fale design
- · Put out mats for the parents at assembly.
- Continue to reflect to Pasifika in school displays e.g. murals, classrooms and foyer
- To use the Multicultural festival items to share for special occasions
- Use the DVD of the 2005 festival to positively promote our school
